### Richard Davis

'The Christian Ministry of Reconciliation and Settler Decolonization in Aotearoa New Zealand', In *Religion in Diverse Societies: Crossing the Boundaries of Prejudice and Distrust*, edited by Pauline Kollontai and Sue Yore (Routledge, 2024)

This edited volume explores what is needed for theology to survive and thrive in the next generation. As well as declining student numbers and pressures on university theology departments, churches are increasingly questioning the value of theological study. The volume addresses the need for innovative responses to this crisis, which re-evaluate the place of theological study in the ecclesial, academic, social and cultural landscape.

'The Logic of Mission: Re-Thinking the Epistemology of Christian Missiology,' *Journal of Analytic Theology* 12 (2024): 29-46

This essay proposes a particularist approach to the study of Christian mission. This epistemological orientation requires us to begin with what we think we already know about both (a) the context and (b) the gospel before (c) evaluating how all that knowledge fits together.

In this article, Anna Abram explores the modern and historical contexts and connotations of leadership, and the ambiguities of this term that seems to resist a straightforward definition. It clarifies the concepts of ethics and spirituality, arguing that these factors are intrinsic to positive leadership. The author discusses the complexities inherent in creating ethical environments in which positive and, above all, practical, leadership may flourish.

### 'Who Do You Think You Are? A Theological Reflection on Identity and Mission in the Anglican Diocese of Mauritius', *Practical Theology* 17.2 (2024): 135–47

This article reflects on a visit to the Diocese of Mauritius in the Anglican Province of the Indian Ocean. In its theological reflection, aspects of the author's Mauritian heritage are held together alongside Anglican tradition, the history of Anglican work on the island, and postcolonial theology. Dunlop makes suggestions to further the ministry and mission of the Anglican Church in Mauritius that is derived from the culture rather than imposed upon it through colonial legacy.

# 'Natural Contemplation – a Christian Healing for the Environment?', *Holiness* 9:2 (November 2024)

Recent studies have acknowledged the insufficiency of rational arguments to motivate us for necessary changes to save the planet: hence the attraction of non-religious ecospiritualities. Identifying Western Christianity's relationship with the environment as more moral than spiritual, White responds to the principle of right relation to the environment developed by the Methodist social creed tradition to recover the neglected tradition of natural contemplation from Christian cosmology and the monastic tradition.
