





There are some surprises in there too: you've also read about **neuropsychiatry, anthropogeography, aesthetics...** and much more!





We hope the Wesley Library will be up and running again after the summer vacation period. Watch this space for further updates.




Wesley Library rare books getting packed and ready in the archive room
