Collection Spotlight:

A Marvellous Holiday: Cambridge through the Eyes of the 20th Century Tourist Westcott House Library's Guidebooks

This collection of guidebooks was discovered in the collection of Westcott House Library, having once belonged to "Donald and Elaine", and were in part given as gifts from former principal Rupert Hoare (1981-1993) and his wife Gesine, and George Guest, organist and choirmaster of St. John's College (1951-1991).

The receipt of these books seems to have prompted the further acquisition of a small collection – or perhaps these souvenirs were selected to add to one already in existence. Their dates of publication vary from pre-war to the 1990s, but any Cantabrigian will recognise the city there depicted within.

The post-war paper shortage; Ward Locke's Cambridge and District, p.12

"The unhappy pedestrian," claims the Ward Lock guide, will frequently encounter "ruthless perambulators and trick-cyclists on push-bikes" who "conspire to thrust one under the motors" — perhaps not much has changed since this book was printed in the post-war years!

This impressively thorough guide to the colleges, halls, landmarks, events, and outlying settlements of Cambridge – rich with etymologies and pocket histories – is filled also with charming advertisements that bookend the guide proper: mostly proclaiming the virtues of destinations, holiday insurance, and suncream. Two foldout coloured maps of the town and county, and a vibrant red paper binding, make for a comprehensive and attractive guide to the city.

A Marvellous Holiday: Cambridge through the Eyes of the 20th Century Tourist Westcott House Library's Guidebooks

Períod Píece: A Cambrídge Chíldhood

This book, first published in 1952, inscribed "From Rupert & Gesine Hoare / With very many thanks for a marvellous holiday August 1988 / The Principal's Lodge / Westcott House / Cambridge." This classic of Cambridge literature details the youth of Gwen Raverat, the granddaughter of Charles Darwin. Describing herself as belonging 'to the first hatching of Fellows' children,' Raverat notes how her mother, an American émigré of the late nineteenthcentury, was less than impressed by the Cambridge theological scene, describing the Round Church as 'almost as old as the hills,' but 'the sermon was rediculous [sic].'



WLLSH women have a fine record in pioneer educational work in Cambridge. One of the founders of Girton was Miss Emily Davies, daughter of a Welsh clergyman. A later mistress was Miss Constance Jones. The first principal of Newnham was Miss Clough, a descendant of the great Sir Richard, And it was a Carmarthen woman, Miss E. P. Hughes, who opened the first training college for women teachers in Cambridge.
