Collection Spotlight: Westcott House's King James 'She' Bible 1611-1613



This very large folio volume over 40cm in length and weighing at least 8kg - is one of the earliest editions of the King James Bible, printed between 1611 and 1613.

This English translation, sponsored by James I and approved by the Church of England, remained the dominant Bible version in the English speaking world for centuries.

This volume includes the Apocrypha, a calendar printed in red and black, and elaborately decorated woodcut Biblical genealogies by John Speed.

This book's history

Looking closely at this book gives us some clues about its history before it made its way to Westcott.

On its front pastedown, an armorial bookplate indicates it was once owned by William Charles de Meuron, Earl Fitzwilliam (1872-1943).

On the same page, a handwritten inscription records that 'K[enneth] W. Wolfe' had the book rebound in 1950.

Two library classmarks (codes classifying where in a library a book should be placed) in Early Modern handwriting suggest that soon after its printing, the book was housed in an institutional library, just like it is today.





'He' or 'She' in Ruth 3:15?

Two editions of the King James Bible were produced in 1611. A key difference is their different translations of Ruth 3:15 from the Hebrew.



The first edition, known as the 'He' Bible, prints: 'Also he said, Bring the vail that thou hast upon thee, and hold it. And when she held it, hee measured sixe measures of barley, and laid it on her: and **he** went into the citie.' The Westcott copy belongs to the second edition, named in contrast the 'She' Bible, and reads instead: 'and **she** went into the citie'.

While this change was likely intended by its 1611 printers as a grammatical correction, the original 'he' is actually a closer translation of the Hebrew text [1]. <u>Today, scholars continue to debate the 'correct' translation</u>.



A crucial mistake...

In the early printing workshop that produced this book, typesetters would build up each line of text by hand, selecting from and combining dozens of individual metal letters at great speed. Mistakes and printing errors were very common!

Here, in Matthew 26:36, 'Then commeth Jesus with them unto a place called Gethsemane...', the book has incorrectly printed 'Judas' instead of Jesus. A later reader has spotted the error and corrected it by hand.
